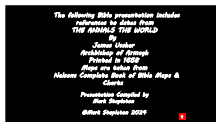
The Tabernacle – Part 8 – What happened next?

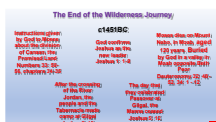

The end of the wilderness journey ⌘ The date is now c1452BC ⌘ Instructions given by God to Moses about the division of the land (Numbers 33: 50-56, chapters 34-35). ⌘ God confirms Joshua as the new leader. (Joshua 1: 1-9). ⌘ Moses dies on Mount Nebo (Deuteronomy 32: 48-52, 34: 1-12). ⌘ The people and the Tabernacle make camp at Gilgal (Joshua 5: 10). ⌘ The Manna ceases on the day Passover is celebrated (Joshua 5: 12). ⌘ to open →

The conquest of Canaan. ⌘ The date is now c1451-1445BC. ⌘ The Central and Southern campaigns – map shown. ⌘ The Northern campaign – map shown. ⌘ to open →

The settlement of the tribes. ‡ The date is now c1445BC. ‡ Map of the land divided. ‡ the division of the land – 2 ½ tribes on the east of the river Jordan, and 9 ½ tribes on the west of the river. ‡ 6 towns of refuge appointed (Joshua 20) – blue circles. ‡ the Tabernacle was moved from Gilgal to Shiloh – red circle. ‡ to open →

The Ark Captured. ‡ The date is now c1116BC. ‡ Map of the land of Israel shown. ‡ The Ark was at Shiloh and was captured by the Philistines. ‡ After 7 months in captivity, the Ark was brought to the house of Abinadab at ‡ Kirjath-Jearim (red circle) ‡ The Ark remained there for 20 years (1 Samuel 7: 2). ‡ to open →

Samuel's rebuke. ‡ The date is now c1096BC. ‡ Map of the land of Israel – showing the Ark at Kirjath-Jearim. ‡ Samuel tells the people to turn from false idol worship, to the true God. ‡ The people confess their sin. ‡ A reminder – 1 John 1:9. ‡ to open →

King David's Reign. ‡ The date is now c1045BC. ‡ Map of the land of Israel. ‡ King David moves the Ark from Kirjath-Jearim to the house of Obed Edam in Jerusalem – picture of the Ark appears. A blue circle appears around Jerusalem. ‡ After 3 months, the Ark is moved to a specially prepared Tabernacle (tent) which David had prepared. ‡ Sacrifices continued to be offered at the Tabernacle in Gibeon.

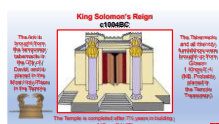

King Solomon's reign. ‡ The date is now c1012BC. ‡ God gives David the plans for the new temple. ‡ David starts collecting materials for the temple. ‡ Solomon starts to lay the foundations of the temple on Mount Moriah. ‡ Christian work must be based on the Lord Jesus Christ (1 Corinthians 3: 11). ‡ to open →

King Solomon's reign (cont'd). ‡ The date is now c1004BC. ‡ Image of the temple – completed after 7½ years – (1 Kings 6: 1, 38) . ‡ The Ark is brought from the temporary tabernacle and placed in the Holy of Holies. ‡ The Tabernacle with all its furnishings were brought up from Gibeon and probably placed in the temple treasury (1 Kings 8: 4). ‡ to open →

Jerusalem plundered by Nebuchadnezzar (8th year of his reign). ‡ Date – c599BC. ‡ Temple items of gold cut in pieces – treasures of the house of the LORD taken – treasures of the King's house taken. ‡ Bible references – 2 Kings 24: 12-13; Jeremiah 20: 5. ‡ to open →

Jerusalem burned by Nebuchadnezzar (19th year of his reign). ‡ Date – c588BC. ‡ Bronze items together with more gold and silver taken by Nebuchadnezzar's army. ‡ Scripture references – 2 Kings 25: 9; Jeremiah 39: 8; 52: 12-13. – rest of the temple and the city destroyed by fire. ‡ to open →

What happened to the Ark of the Covenant? ‡ 1. It has been suggested that the Ark was probably destroyed in the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple by Nebuchadnezzar in c588BC. ‡ 2. On the return from Captivity in Babylon, the people set about to re-build the Temple. The Altar was re-built and some

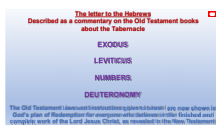
items of silver and gold were brought back to Jerusalem by King Cyrus of Persia (Ezra chapters 1-6) – no mention of the Ark! ‡ 3. There is no mention of the Ark in the Holy of Holies in Ezekiel's Temple, described in Ezekiel chapters 40-47. ‡ 4. The prophet Jeremiah declare that the Ark – "... shall not come to mind, nor shall they remember it, nor shall they visit it, nor shall it be made any more (Jeremiah 3: 16). ‡ 5. The Ark was a sign of God's presence with His people – it is now no longer necessary, as the Holy Spirit dwells in the lives of individuals and in the local Church. ‡ to open →

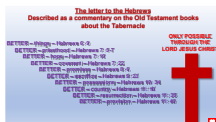
What about TODAY compare with the days of the Tabernacle? ‡ TODAY - Christ is the Head of the Church (Ephesians 5: 23).. ‡ TODAY – God will bring His people to their heavenly home (John 14: 2). ‡ TODAY – there is still only one way into God's presence (John 14: 6). ‡ TODAY - God's laws are to be obeyed (John 14: 15). ‡ TODAY – We must worship God in His way (John 4: 23). ‡ TODAY – God provides a sacrifice for us (Hebrews 9: 22). ‡ TODAY – God's presence is always with His people (Matthew 28: 20). ‡ TODAY – God provides for His people (Philippians 4: 19). ‡ to open →

The letter to the Hebrews, has been described as a commentary on the Old Testament books about the Tabernacle. ‡ Exodus – Leviticus – Numbers – Deuteronomy. ‡ The Old Testament laws and instructions are now shown in god's plan of Redemption for everyone who believes in the finished and completed work of the Lord Jesus Christ, as revealed in the New Testament. ‡ to open →

The letter to the Hebrews, has been described as a commentary on the Old Testament books about the Tabernacle.. Those living in Old Testament times, looked forward, by faith, to the time when the promised Saviour would be the one sacrifice for sin. Hebrews chapter 11 gives examples of those who lived by faith – faith is – “the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen (Hebrews 11: 1). What God has in store for those who are redeemed, experience - ‡ BETTER things (Hebrews 6: 9), ‡ a BETTER priesthood (Hebrews 7: 5-7), ‡ a BETTER hope (Hebrews 7: 19), ‡ a BETTER covenant (Hebrews 7: 22), ‡ BETTER promises (Hebrews 8: 6), ‡ a BETTER sacrifice (Hebrews 9: 23), ‡ BETTER possessions (Hebrews 10: 34), ‡ a BETTER country (Hebrews 11: 16), ‡ a BETTER resurrection

(Hebrews 11: 35) and ‡ a BETTER provision (Hebrews 11: 40). ‡ Only possible through th Lord Jesus Christ. - Cross is shown.

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
